Caribbean Anchoring Challenges

Eastern Caribbean anchorages present trade winds that shift overnight, thin sand over coral rubble, crowded bays with limited scope room, and hard structure for fishing stops. Modern scoop anchors outperform traditional designs in all of these conditions.

Recommended Anchors

Anchor	Weight	Best Bottom	Price Range
Mantus M1	35 lb	Sand, mud, mixed	\$320–\$420
Rocna Vulcan 15	33 lb	Mixed / all-bottom	\$280–\$380
Fortress FX-37	7 lb	Sand, mud	\$200–\$260
Lewmar Bruce	22 lb	Sand, mud	\$90–\$140
Slide Anchor Box	varies	Hard bottom / reef	\$80–\$180

Scope — The Variable People Underestimate

- Calm conditions: 5:1 scope minimum
- 20+ knot trade winds: 7:1 minimum
- Strong conditions / coral bottom: 10:1 for reliable holding

→ *Scope is the cheapest improvement you can make to your anchoring system.*

Complete Anchoring System

Chain: Minimum 50 feet of chain at the anchor end. 5/16" HT chain covers most boats to 40 feet.

Snubber: Nylon snubber from chain to deck cleat — absorbs shock, reduces boat movement, protects windlass.

Anchor Light: Required by law, IPX-rated LED visible 2 miles. Essential safety in busy Caribbean anchorages.

Final Recommendation

Mantus M1 35lb for Caribbean cruising and overnight anchoring. Add a Slide Anchor Box for fishing stops over hard structure. Always size up — the holding difference between marginal and correct anchor sizing is the difference between sleeping and watching the alarm.
